THE LESSONS

The First Reading

Lector: A Reading from the Prophet Jeremiah

Jeremiah 17:5-10

Thus says the Lord:

Cursed are those who trust in mere mortals and make mere flesh their strength, whose hearts turn away from the LORD.

They shall be like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see when relief comes.

They shall live in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land.

Blessed are those who trust in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD.

They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream.

It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green;

in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit.

The heart is devious above all else; it is perverse-who can understand it?

I the LORD test the mind and search the heart,

to give to all according to their ways, according to the fruit of their doings.

The Second Reading

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ--whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

The Gospel

Luke 6:17-26

Gospeler: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus came down with the twelve apostles and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God.

"Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.

"Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

Sermon The Rev. Conrad Selnick

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love.

You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace. But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Announcements

"Alleluias" in the liturgy: This is an ancient word from our Jewish cousins and heritage. It is an exclamation of spiritual joy roughly meaning "Thanks be to God!" or "Bless you, God!" It is never incorrect in a liturgy, but is more suited to some occasions and seasons. It is particularly suited to Easter season, and conversely not suited for Lent. Emmanuel has become accustomed to using it weekly, pretty much year-round. As part of our transition period, we are hewing more closely to the specifics in the Prayer Book and other authorized Episcopal liturgical material. This is a regular practice during interim periods, and it reflects the Rector's full responsibility for liturgy as outlined in Episcopal Canons. We are also trying out less familiar materials from these sources. As we close out the Season of Epiphany, we will start making limited use of it. And, on the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, we will use the common custom of saying good by to "Alleluia" until Easter Vigil. After Easter season we will sometimes include "Alleluia" in liturgies, and sometimes not.

Below are the two places in the Holy Eucharist liturgy which address the inclusion of Alleliua.

[Alleluia.] Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

Therefore let us keep the feast. [Alleluia.]

In Lent, Alleluia is omitted, and may be omitted at other times except during Easter Season.

From the Easter Vigil through the Day of Pentecost"Alleluia, alleluia" may be added to any of the dismissals.
